




Introducing our Piano Accompanist, Nely Burla...

Nely has been a part of Pelham Music Festival for many years. A concert pianist and piano teacher, she received a doctorate degree in Piano Performance from Saratov State Conservatory; has performed numerous recitals as a soloist and chamber musician in major halls in Ukraine, Russia, Israel, Canada and the United States; and taught piano to students from beginners to professionals who now perform and teach in music schools and colleges.

Between sessions, we're honored to feature the following faculty performers:

Marcia Bean is celebrating her 30th year of teaching, and has enjoyed making music together with Pelham students since 1997. She previously taught public school orchestra in Wisconsin, where she also earned her teaching credentials and Master of Music degree in viola performance as a Strelow string quartet fellow at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Her undergraduate degree in viola is from the Oberlin College Conservatory. She has regularly performed in regional orchestras and opera companies in Wisconsin and the New York metro area, and teaches privately in New Rochelle. Her main teacher-development project at the moment is Suzuki method teacher training and certification. She is grateful to the founders of the Pelham Music Festival who invited her to join the event many years back, and enjoys watching the students every year as they play music with friends from around town.

Andrew Dolgon is a music educator and performer who loves to share his passion for music with others. He teaches elementary band in the Pelham School District and maintains a studio of students studying tuba and trombone. When Andrew is not teaching, he enjoys playing tuba in multiple ensembles. He currently plays with the Westchester Symphonic Winds, Tappan Zee Bridgemen, and the Westchester Community Band. Andrew studied tuba from some notable teachers throughout his collegiate experience, including Velvet Brown, Aaron Tindall, and Ronald Romm. He has performed at multiple venues including The Krannert Center for the Performing Arts in Champaign, IL, The Brucknerhaus in Linz, Austria, and David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center. Andrew is excited to bring students back to the festival again this year, and to serve as liaison between PMF and the Pelham School District.

Enid Blount Press, clarinetist, has a diverse musical performing and teaching career in the New York City area. She has performed as a clarinetist at many of the major performance halls in New York City as well as at numerous other national and international venues. She is the clarinetist/bass clarinetist of the progressive chamber rock group Angels in the Chamber and enjoys performing as a soloist and with a variety of groups as a classical, jazz and improvisatory musician. Enid has performance degrees from UNC School of the Arts, Oberlin Conservatory, and University of Southern California. She enjoys teaching clarinet and saxophone, as well as young pianists, mentoring teenage clarinet teachers at Songcatchers in New Rochelle, as well as coaching adult chamber music at PointCounterpoint in Vermont each summer. Enid is thrilled to be back at Pelham Music Festival this year with her students and to be featured as a faculty performer.

Amy Hersh has an active career that combines her love of chamber music, orchestral performance, and teaching. The New York Times has written that Ms. Hersh "plays the flute [...] with directness and an ear for subtlety." She currently plays with the Hudson Valley Symphony Orchestra (formerly the Hudson Valley Philharmonic), the New York Gilbert and Sullivan Players, the Virtuosi Wind Quintet, and the Cara Quartet. Ms. Hersh began her career playing piccolo with the Mexico City Philharmonic and the Filharmonica del Bajio, and has played with the New Jersey Symphony, in various Broadway pit orchestras, such as Les Miserables and Annie, and in numerous New York area orchestras. She gave her New York debut at Weill Hall as an Artist's International winning member of the "Venus Trio", a group comprising flute, harp, and mezzo-soprano, and was a winner of the New York Flute Club competition. Ms. Hersh received her Bachelors and Masters of Music from the Manhattan School of Music. Locally, she teaches at the Hackley School, at her home studio in Pelham, and is the flute teacher mentor at the Songcatchers program in New Rochelle.
